ISU students have significantly more interactions with faculty than students at other institutions

86% of seniors rate their experience at ISU as good or excellent

65% of seniors participate in a high **impact practices**

Students who work on **campus** witness a higher sense of belonging

Students are engaging in dialog with folks from different backgrounds, including race, sexual orientation and economic background.

First-year students rate interactions with advisors as significantly higher than students at other institutions

Seniors report significant learning gains in speaking, teamwork and careerrelated skills







ISU students report higher engagement with faculty than students at peer universities.

This is important because faculty can act as mentors, experts and supportive advocates. Faculty also model professional and intellectual work. Frequent and positive engagement with faculty is highly associated with student success.

There is a positive relationship between student satisfaction and student success.




Peer universities are Carnegie class peer institutions.

High impact practices require effort, encourage meaningful collaborations between faculty and students and provide frequent formative feedback.





Students look to advisors for support and guidance. Positive interactions communicate to students they belong and instill confidence in their ability to succeed.












ISU seniors report significant learning gains in working with others, acquiring career skills and speaking effectively. These gains are lower for students at peer universities.



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
Percent of ISU & comparison group seniors who report their institution has contributed very much or quite a bit to their learning

Student reported frequency engaging in discussions with people by demographic




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Students who work on campus are more likely to feel like a part of the ISU community than students who work off campus.

Students who work on campus gain practical skills, create meaningful relationships with faculty and staff and witness more positive outcomes than students who work off campus.
